I think we all realize the pains of 2020 will carry over into at least some of the coming year. Even so, I am glad to see this year come to a close and have great hopes for 2021. With a new year, comes a new theme I want to introduce before we actually get to January 1. Maybe I want the new year to hurry up and get here, but more than that, I would like for all of us to begin thinking about how this theme might impact our family of faith and those in our city and beyond. The phrase 'BELOVED COMMUNITY' is not original to me, but something I have been studying for several years, all the way back to 1999 when I began seriously reading and examining the life of Martin Luther King, Jr. The pinnacle of my MLK Jr studies was my dissertation completed in 2013 as I wrote about how King understood the identity and work of the church. Without going into detail here, the crux of King's ecclesiology boils down to his beliefs about how Christians are to create a 'beloved community' in Christ that manifests the love of God in a hostile world.

The centerpiece for this theme is from the Gospel of John 13:1-17 as Jesus washes the disciples' feet. For me, this powerful story demonstrates the heart of beloved community and what it takes to create and sustain it. The sacrificial spirit, humility, service, care, work and love – the symbolism of the towel, basin, water, cleanliness, Jesus bowed down, the timeframe of being so close to the crucifixion – all of this and much more will help us understand what it takes to build a community of love that serves, proclaims the Gospel, makes disciples and ultimately could heal the world. A community built on love – love of God and neighbor – that demonstrates its love in tangible ways through acts of justice, mercy and humility can heal wounds, bridge divides, give hope and fulfill our purpose of bringing God's Kingdom to earth as it is in heaven.

I am optimistic that FBC can embody this theme in the coming year in an even deeper and more meaningful way than we already do. So let's start the discussion – in our Bible studies, small groups, committees, advisory teams, in our deacon body, in the hallways (when we are able!), through our worship experiences, in our missions, spiritual formation, with our youth and children, in our Zoom meetings – wherever we can – even with our neighbors, friends, co-workers, family and strangers. We start with the question of what does it mean to incarnate a beloved community of Christ? We can also start with John 13 and ask that same question as it pertains to the passage.

I said the following in 2019 when I discussed the theme of 2020, CONNECT-GROW-SERVE: These themes are not a gimmick for me. They are what I believe to be essential and structural principles for what it means to be a healthy church. In my tenure as FBC Pastor, I will continually draw from every yearly theme. You've not heard the end of CONNECT-GROW-SERVE, and after 2021, you will continue to hear about creating and sustaining a beloved community in Christ. My prayer is that we pray earnestly about these ideas and faithfully work to manifest their virtue. For those seeking the identity, values, mission and vision of FBC, my prayer is these themes will bring clarity. We can't be just listeners; the themes can't be just promotional materials or PR. We must put feet to our faith and provide substance to theories. The good news is that we already do in so many ways – but these commitments must be renewed all the time. Creativity and improvements are needed. Financial support, volunteer support and new members are also needed. There is work to do. I believe we are the people to do it. Are you ready?

If there is any one thing that I've not only taken away from the events of this past year, but am still in the process of learning, it is the idea of "beloved community," our 2021 church theme. More specifically, I am in a process of learning to not only be beloved but more importantly, letting others know that they are beloved as well. I wonder if you can relate to any of this.

As we enter into this new year, I want to walk alongside our students and help them live into the following reality: Be Beloved. In my mindscape, this reality serves a twofold purpose. In one sense, I want each of them individually to know and feel that they are loved - whether through being heard, seen, or acknowledged. Likewise, I also want them to know and feel a sense of affirmation. To this point, it makes me wonder what self-affirmation resembles.

In another sense, I want our students to affirm to those around them that they are loved - that they too are heard, seen, and acknowledged. Off the top of my mind, I can't think of more loving and affirming gestures than reaching out to others in these ways. It could resemble something as simple as offering a listening presence or a physical one without even saying a word (even if it's from six feet away).

How will we live this reality of being beloved heading into the new year?









We are blessed with so many opportunities for deep community here at First Baptist Church. As I have visited Sunday School classes and taken part in Bible studies and small group book studies these last few months, I've gotten a glimpse into the richness of the relationships among the members of these groups. In a season when many of us have been hungry for in-person gatherings, I've been astounded at the depth of conversation and learning that each of these groups has been able to sustain even when forced to meet digitally. I am grateful for the many ways I have witnessed you being the beloved community for one another, from engaging playfully in Kara's weekly #FundayFridayAtFBC posts on Facebook to making phone calls, sending cards, and taking care of one another's needs during this challenging season. I am looking forward to continuing to expand and grow our opportunities to connect and learn together in the coming year as we seek a more thorough understanding and a deeper practice of what it is to be the beloved community.



Missions is the hands on work, the doing of this Beloved Community we seek. As I've learned about the missions FBC already does since I joined you in July, I've seen so much good already at work. So now let's take this year and refine it. Let's ask ourselves if we're making the most impact, if we're working towards solutions most needed. As Keith says every Sunday morning, let's go be the church.

Mission Frankfort Clinic will continue doing great work serving those without access to health insurance. In 2021, we'll begin researching whether the dream of a denture lab as part of MFC is feasible and sustainable, both fiscally and physically. We're working on a new paid position that will mean our service to Spanish speaking patients is more equitable with that to our English speaking patients.

We're welcoming a new permanent director at Emma Quire Mission Center to start 2021 and will hopefully be able to welcome back teams sometime during the year. But beyond that we're going to seek connections, expand the vision beyond a place to house mission teams, and work towards being a hub of activity that creates Beloved Community in Owsley County.

But more importantly than all of that, I hope this year of focus on Beloved Community is one in which you as an individual learn and grow in your understanding of what helping, charity, and being the hands and feet of Jesus can mean. I hope you'll join me in digging into the best ideas and thoughts from theologians, non-profit professionals, and the people on the margins themselves that can help us create change, offer hope, and work towards the Kin-dom of God here on earth in ways that bring dignity, prosperity, offer hope and value. If we're going to be those hands and feet offering help, let's do it in the best way we can.
