As I reflect on our financial statement for the past year, I am overwhelmed with a sense of gratitude and awe. In one of the most challenging seasons I can imagine for a church, you gave 5% more than in the previous year. In a time where the 'offering plates' were not passed down the aisle, you found new ways to make sure our church was supported through tithes and offerings. My prayer is we will continue this high level of faithful stewardship. Our church is primed to make great strides in the new year. Thank you for this encouraging part of what was in many other ways a discouraging year.

Before COVID, I was working on something I entitled 'THE WELCOMING PROJECT'. The ideas put forth by the Feasibility Team were the root of this effort. We are blessed with wonderful facilities, but I believe they can be more welcoming in the future by taking care of some much needed improvements. In my opinion, the most important area that needs help is our restrooms, particularly on our main floor. We need

accessible restrooms (ADA compliant). This is a 'big ticket' item as you might imagine. Our Properties Team will be investigating what a project like this might entail. PLEASE NOTE this is only in the investigative stage right now. Such a project would certainly need to come before the church, the Finance Committee and basically go through all the right protocol for approval. I ask that you make it a matter of prayer. We want to be good stewards of the healthy financial position we are in. Ask God for wisdom and guidance as we look at the possibilities.

Our staff is actively pursuing a plan for our church to be able to gather in-person just as soon as it can be safely done. We are communicating with experts about the vaccine and the virus as we have done for the past eleven months. As the distribution of the vaccine continues, we are getting closer to resuming our in-person activities. I am thankful for your patience and excited we are edging closer to the time of being together, again. Please be in prayer that we will handle this process in the best way possible. Until then, let us resolve to continue to be present in all our virtual activities. Thank you for being a wonderful model of adapting and remaining faithful during trying times.

## GRANT WORK; NEW PAID POSITION IN MFC

The start of a new year means checking grant information and reviewing all the new deadlines and opportunities for both Mission Frankfort Clinic (MFC) and Emma Quire Mission Center. This makes plenty of research for me!

I’m happy to report that our largest grant funder for MFC just notified us of our award for 2021! The application, submitted in December with the Baugh Foundation, was approved just last week. They have supported us for the past several years. We are so grateful for their support, because they are willing to fund salaries for staff, unlike many other grant makers. Their grant covers the salaries for our Clinic Administrator, three interns from local colleges, and a new position this year, a part-time Spanish language Clinic Coordinator! All of these staff positions help maintain the consistency needed for our patients and volunteer healthcare professionals from week to week.

We are excited to welcome one of our volunteer translators into a paid position. She truly goes above and beyond, working outside of regular clinic hours to coordinate appointments via text and Facebook messenger and relay prescription refill information to us. With her help we’re able to take our communications with Spanish speaking patients to a higher level, ensuring they can understand vital information necessary for their health.

## TOY STORE

In spite of a pandemic, and due to the generosity of our church family, the Toy Store was able to help 93 families by providing toys, books, and stuffed animals for 210 children. Partnering with city and county schools allowed FBC to find families in need of assistance.

Our FBC elves shopped from our stock of donated and purchased items and were able to provide specific items the children would like. The items were packaged and distributed safely to families at a drive through event.

Thank you for your donations. You made a brighter Christmas for many children.



# THE LENTEN STORY

When you first pick up the Godly Play materials for Lent, they are decidedly dull-looking. In a room that contains gold boxes full of felt parables, wooden replicas that help tell Old Testament stories, and even real live candles, the Lenten story with its seven simple wooden cards and purple felt roll hardly screams, “Pick me!”

And yet, six(ish?) years into practicing Godly Play, I’ve come to love the Lenten story – in fact, it’s one of my favorites. The materials for the story, which is titled “The Faces of Easter,” are simple, but the words are rich. In just seven cards, presented during the six weeks of Lent and on Easter, kids hear the whole story of Jesus’ life, from birth to resurrection. They learn about Jesus going missing on his family’s trip to the temple as an adolescent. They hear about Jesus’ baptism and time in the desert being tempted and contemplating who he was and the work he had been given. They hear about Jesus doing that work – coming close to people and telling stories about God’s dream. Finally, they learn about the last supper, crucifixion, and resurrection. There is so much life packed into these seven wooden tiles.

If your kids haven’t been participating in Godly Play on Zoom, Lent is a great time to start. If they have, let me encourage you to keep up that practice heading into the Lenten season. The links are available in our weekly children’s ministry emails and through the prayer list page on our website.

The Lenten story may not be the one that jumps out at your kids when they’re surveying the shelves in the Godly Play classroom, but it’s certainly one that will write itself on their hearts and that they’ll come back to for years and years to come.


